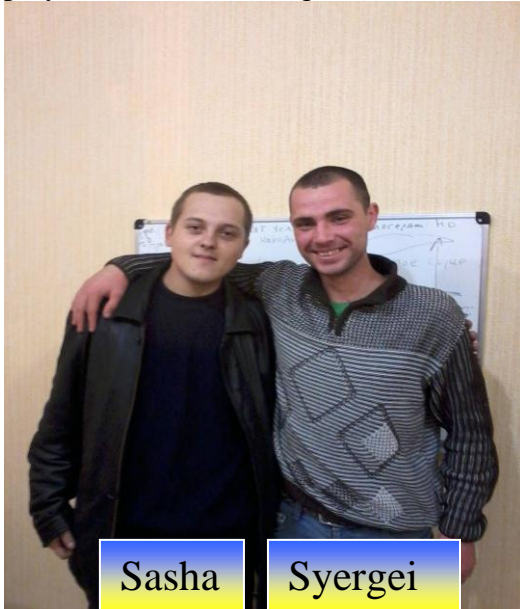


November 2011 Newsletter

The Lord gave me a message that I titled “Called by Name”(vs.30)—it contains some practical applications from Ex. 35 for the church-age pastor, in building the “*tabernacle*”, rather than the *believers* and their walk. The first point from vs. 31—“filled with the spirit of God”, “wise, understanding, and knowledgable” (pertaining to building God’s work), and “a heart to teach”. Verse 32—“curious works” (drawing the interest/curiosity of the listeners), “work in gold, and in silver” (it helps to know how to handle money properly), “and in brass” (being wise in judgment). Verse 33 deals with cutting and carving (character) and you can imagine with what instrument...the word of God, of course. Lastly, Bezaleel had a helper by the name of Aholiab (meaning “tabernacle of the Father”)—there should be helpers in the local church. The Lord gave me another message titled “Three Questions out of Proverbs Chapter 20”. The first question (vs. 6), “a faithful man who can find?”; the second (vs. 9), “Who can say, I have made my heart clean, I am pure from my sin?”; and the last question (vs. 24), “...how can a man then understand his own way?” By the grace of God I was able to preach this message before our prayer time on Wednesday night (a week ago) and we had a guest for the first time! His name is Sasha (a nickname, here, for “Alexander”) and he was a coworker of Syerge’s. He prayed to receive the Lord as his Saviour that Wednesday night, after the service! Thank you for your support and prayers, which made it possible to tell Sasha the “good news”!



I also would like to say, “thank you” to those that have given extra for the church house building. We have funds for part of the walls (mainly the blocks that will be used for the exterior walls). We will continue to save for this, though buying the necessary things in *winter* would be cheaper since demand is less. We still need to save a lot of money. The Lord showed me some things about the apostle Paul’s disposition on giving and receiving. Paul actually joyed in *necessity* but then turned right around and told the Philippian church (the church that gave) that God would supply all their *needs*! Paul knew that there was something

taking place spiritually when a christian was in need but *joyed* in that to the glory of God! The need wasn’t always met, which leads me to think that out of constant *necessity* he learned to be content with the things that he had...contrarywise, the natural man always wants to be *full*.
